Northwest Sector Precinct Report: (not present)

SPD Online Scam Presentation: (Officer Tim Schwering)

Officer Schwering talked about current online scams and the importance of being cautious when
dealing with technology and online interactions, as these scams are becoming more common and
can lead to significant financial losses. He encouraged the attendees to share any concerns or
suspicions with him, as he is willing to help investigate and provide guidance.

Discussion Items

Mansfield Grocery Update: (Clay Elliott)

• Clay led a discussion about the Mansfield grocery update, focusing on the developer's attempt to resubmit for a plan 3 application, which involves a more public process. He expressed optimism

about the potential to challenge the application successfully, given the hearing examiner's previous ruling. He also shared his visit to a similar store on 29th Ave, describing it as unattractive and not an enhancement to the neighborhood. The group agreed that the proposed convenience store would not be an improvement and that the developer would need to demonstrate mitigating circumstances to override any negative impact.

Proposed Safe Streets Project for Washington & Buckeye

• Eileen led a discussion about a proposed pilot project for the Buckeye and Washington intersection. The project, which is part of the city's Safe Streets and Adaptive Design initiative, aims to improve pedestrian safety by potentially closing the southbound lane of Washington and making it northbound only. However, some have expressed concerns about the effectiveness of this plan in mitigating pedestrian crossing issues. The project is temporary and could involve the use of planter boxes to block the road. The city plans to gather feedback from potentially affected neighbors through door-to-door visits and email. Eileen also mentioned that the Neighborhood Council should be on the list of agencies to review the project. The next steps include providing feedback and asking questions about the project, which will be shared with city council representatives.

 At the last meeting Carlie attended there was a presentation regarding the sidewalk pilot project. She mentioned that District 3 has the largest number of missing ramps. She said this was a 20-

year program and the first part of the project is to find where the sidewalks are located. She

mentioned that there are 4 vacancies on the Bike advisory board.
