Dear Neighborhood Chairs and Representatives,

Last year the Legislature gave cities the authority to install speed radar cameras within 300 feet of hospitals and City owned park land. City Council would like to approve new camera locations in a batch this Spring so that we can achieve effective speed enforcement in these areas that experience high pedestrian and bicyclist use. If your neighborhood would like to nominate a location for a new speed camera within the criteria listed above, please provide Jeff Gunn (jgunn@spokanecity.org) from Council with a signed resolution by Wednesday, March 1. If your neighborhood won't be meeting between now and March 1, you may send an email explaining that and when you are likely to provide a resolution.

State law also allows the City to reduce speed limits to 20 mph on arterials bordering parks, but in order to do so, the City must undertake a traffic study. Council was able to temporarily reduce speeds under these circumstances for a two year pilot project, which we completed a year ago. If you would like to nominate a park(s) bordering an arterial for 20 mph please include that in your resolution as well. The camera and reduced speed limit don't necessarily have to go together, but they can and we would like to take care of all these requests at once.

Finally, Council is reviewing applications for its Initiative Manager for Transportation and Connectivity and looks forward to soon having a new point person on this, the continuation of the master four year neighborhood traffic calming list and other similar initiatives.

Proposed 2023 Mobile Speed Feedback Signs

Applications due April 7 | Placements: two business weeks | Active May—September

The City of Spokane has six mobile speed feedback trailers that collect data and two mobile speed feedback trailers that do NOT collect data that are placed throughout the City by the request of Neighborhood Councils. The signs show drivers how quickly they are moving and collect speed data. Speed data is then reported to the neighborhood at the end of each program year. These signs were purchased through funding designated through the Traffic Calming Program.

The trailers collect data for 11 days within a 14-day period, unless affected by holidays. The trailer faces one direction and will not be moved during its placement to capture the opposite flow of traffic. Please follow all rules stated on webpage. Keep in mind bike lanes, sunlight access for solar panel, and unobstructed radar range (no bumper-to-bumper parking) for optimal locations. Trailers are not effective near controlled intersections and stop signs. Date-availability on a first-come, first-serve basis. We may shorten or cancel use of a speed sign in a neighborhood if one of the signs are vandalized or damaged. If this occurs, the Office of Neighborhood Services will contact you to discuss rescheduling options if signs are available.

Meeting February 1, 2023.

Presentation: Spokane's local historic preservation districts; new designations
Presenter: Megan Duvall, Spokane City Preservation Office

There are 5 local historic districts and a proposed new one of Cannon Streetcar Suburban Historic District is illustrated and serves as an example of the process.

Property owners are contacted about proposal. Properties are selected as historically significant or not. Architectural features and use are considered.

New construction (exterior only) is reviewed for districts historical authenticity or representation. Fifty percent plus 1 are needed for over approval.

A public hearing is conducted as well. City government committee reviews to accept or reject.

Districts may have as few as 4 properties. Cannon Streetcar has about 500.

Next meeting scheduled for March 1, 2023
