CA Land Use Committee Meeting March 1, 2023

Subject: Housing supply and demand in Spokane: changes allowing increased density

Presenters: 1. Amanda Beck, Spokane City Long-Range Planning. 2. KayCee Downey, Spokane City Building Opportunity and Choices for All (BOCA).

Long-range planning involves the Housing Action Plan and code changes that allow greater density and fewer restrictions for current and new accessory dwelling units and construction allowing multi-family units with common walls and more aesthethetic proportions and entrances than in the past. Spokane population growth has exceeded that projected of about 5 years agoour current population level was projected for 2037 based on that prior linear scale!

Home ownership potential based on income is down over last three years. Average rent is \$1,202 per month.

Discussion of City Ordinance C36232. This has been cited before for increasing density of multi-units in the city. Builders are allowed vesting periods of up to 5 years to work on a project.

BOCA does not cover accessory dwelling units, but has generally allowed larger units and new construction must have aesthetic designs for green space, windows, proportions and distances from street and property lines. A fear of BOCA allowing if not encouraging destruction of existing viable housing was dispelled by noting that this is not encouraged and is not cost effective, and has not occurred.

The City of Spokane has six mobile speed feedback trailers that collect data and two that do not that can be placed throughout the city by the request of the neighborhood councils, allotting roughly two trailers per City Council district. Through the Mobile Speed Feedback Program, the signs are placed for two weeks (unless affected by holidays). Remember, only one direction of traffic is captured at a time, and the sign needs adequate space and access to sunlight to work effectively. 
