4. Guest Speakers

SPD Northwest Sector Precinct Report

• No SPD representative was present

Senator Marcus Riccelli

- Constituents should have received pamphlets in the mail with an update from the last legislative session.
- Lawmakers are tasked to create a balanced budget every two years. These were grueling
 sessions, all the more challenging because of the budget deficit. The objective was to scrub the
 budget and look for efficiencies while trying to protect key essential services.
- Sen. Riccelli's top priorities included housing and food security. He is working to push North Spokane Corridor project to completion.

- Sen. Riccelli is proud of several achievements. One was securing \$3 million for a regional crisis stabilization center, another was creating a law enforcement training facility.
- One goal is to establish a minimum level of senior income for property tax. Sen Riccelli is working with Rep. Voltz to propose an exemption based on duration of home ownership, possibly 25+ years.
- Q: Property prices have doubled, which means taxes have doubled. Hyperinflation has affected homeowners' ability to pay property tax. Maybe there are creative ways to increase or diversify the tax base?
- Q: Why the elimination of the minimum parking requirement? A. Was designed to incentivize more housing development.
- Q. What about taxing empty properties? A. Sen. Riccelli is on a committee to develop a policy along those lines with a phased-in approach.
- Q. What are you seeing as a state concern? What is Washingtonians' biggest worry? A. Eastern
 and Central WA would be severely impacted by loss of Medicare/Medicaid coverage a 'crisis
 level' issue. Additionally, services like special education and behavioral health could be impacted
 with societal repercussions.
- Sen. Riccelli and other lawmakers will be at the Emerson-Garfield Farmers' Market on Fri., June 13 to answer questions in person.

Spokane City Council (CM Zack Zappone)

- Spokane Transit Authority update: There was a story on KXLY about the CEO search. CM
 Zappone voted against the idea of bringing only one candidate forward for public review.
- Monday, June 16 is the vote on Home Starts Here homeless ordinances. It is part of a multipronged "all-above" approach to addressing homelessness.
- Q. How many people are considered an encampment? A. It can be just 1 if they have 'camping' equipment.
- The City's approach to the ICE protest taking place this minute is to allow for civil disobedience but not allow transgression of obstruction laws.
- Buckeye and Washington traffic-calming project: There will be a town hall meeting in September for the 2026 project on how to address the intersection.

Euclid traffic-calming project: Funding of speed bumps passed City Council. The City recorded
average speeds in the area over a single day: 28 MPH on Euclid, 32 MPH on Cora (with extreme
speeds up to 70 MPH). Ideally, the neighborhood would like to see speed mitigation in all three
locations (Euclid hill, Euclid, Cora), with priority on Euclid hill.

5. Voting Items

Signing the Good Neighbor Agreement with Jewels Helping Hands

- Katie Schneider voiced concern about the lack of accountability in the agreement. A discussion followed about recourse for potential problems and Jewels Helping Hands' reputation in the community.
- Gina McKenzie proposed a motion to not sign the Good Neighbor Agreement
 - i. Gina McKenzie moved, Bill Heaton seconded
 - ii. 7 votes in favor, 14 against, 1 abstention (motion failed)
- The Good Neighbor Agreement will be revisited at the August EGNC meeting.

July meeting

- The EGNC typically votes on whether or not to meet in July. EGNC Chair Eileen Kazura said that she anticipates council business to be light.
- Tim Musser proposed a motion to not meet in July
 - i. Tim Musser moved, Katie Schneider seconded
 - ii. Unanimous approval

Community Engagement (CE) Grant

- In the interest of transparency, Katie Schneider requested a follow-up vote that expressly mentions the Concert in the Park as a funding allocation.
- Katie Schneider proposed a motion that would distribute Emerson-Garfield's \$800 CE Grant in the following way: \$175 for a one-year Zoom license, with the remaining balance (\$625) to the Summer Concert.
